• New Member Benefit: *The Review of Symbolic Logic.* Beginning in 2008, individual ASL members will receive the new ASL journal, *The Review of Symbolic Logic*, as an additional benefit of membership. Publication of the *RSL* by Cambridge University Press will commence in June 2008, and members should receive the first issue shortly thereafter.

Joining *The Journal of Symbolic Logic* and *The Bulletin of Symbolic Logic* as the third official organ of the Association, the *RSL* will publish research papers in: philosophical and non-classical logics and their applications; history and philosophy of logic; and philosophy and methodology of mathematics. The first heading covers all areas of philosophical logic, plus applications of these logics in such fields as computer science, linguistics, game theory and decision theory, formal epistemology, cognitive science, and artificial intelligence. The second is intended to include the history of philosophy of logic, an area that overlaps substantially with what is often called 'history of analytic philosophy'. The third area includes both the philosophy of mathematics and methodological studies of mathematical practice, past and present.

- ASL Membership Dues Increase. By action of the ASL Council, in the year 2009 the dues for individual membership in the Association will increase to US\$82; in 2008 the dues are US\$76, and they have been at this rate since 2006. (For student members, the 2009 dues will be US\$41 and in 2008 they are US\$38, as they have been since 2006.) According to the ASL Constitution, if by August 1, 2008, at least 5 percent of the individual members petition the Secretary-Treasurer, the increase in dues would have to be approved in the 2008 ASL Election by a majority of those voting.
- ASL Newsletter via Email in September 2008. Beginning in September 2008, the ASL Newsletter will be sent by email to all members for whom the ASL has an email address and who do not specifically request to be sent the printed version. Details on how to exercise this "opt out" privilege and to verify that the email address that the ASL has is correct were distributed with the 2008 membership renewal form. An "opt out" form is included in this Newsletter mailing also.
- 2008 Sacks Prize. The ASL invites nominations for the 2008 Sacks Prize for the most outstanding doctoral dissertation in mathematical logic. Nominations must be received by September 30, 2008. The Sacks Prize was established to honor Professor Gerald Sacks of MIT and Harvard for his unique contribution to mathematical logic, particularly as adviser to a large number of excellent Ph.D. students. The Prize was first awarded in 1994 and became an ASL Prize in 1999. The Fund on which the Prize is based is now administered by the ASL and the selection of the recipient is made by the ASL Committee on Prizes and Awards. Anyone who wishes to make a nomination for the 2008 Sacks Prize should consult the webpage http://www.aslonline.org/Sacks_nominations.html for the precise details of the application process. A brief summary of the procedure is provided below.

Students who defend their dissertations (equivalent to the American doctoral dissertation) between October 1, 2007, and September 30, 2008, are eligible for the Prize this year. This is an international prize, with no restriction on the nationality of the candidate or the university where the doctorate is granted. Nominations should be made by the thesis adviser, and consist of: name of student, title and 1–2 page description of dissertation, date

and location where the doctorate was awarded, letter of recommendation from the adviser, and an electronic copy of the thesis in .pdf or .ps form, or the address of a web site from which an electronic copy in .pdf or .ps form can be downloaded. An independent second letter of recommendation is strongly encouraged. Nominations should be sent to the Committee Chair, Julia Knight; .pdf or .ps files sent as attachments by email to Julia.F. Knight.1@nd.edu are preferred. The form of such letters and other pertinent details can be found at the web site above, and need to be read prior to submitting a nomination. To be considered for a Travel Award, please (1) send a letter of application, and (2) ask your thesis supervisor to send a brief recommendation letter. The application letter should be brief (preferably one page) and should include: (1) your name; (2) your home institution; (3) your thesis supervisor's name; (4) a one-paragraph description of your studies and work in logic, and, in the case of an ASL student member application to attend an ASL or ASL-sponsored meeting other than the Annual Meeting or European Summer Meeting, a paragraph indicating why it is important to attend the meeting; (5) your estimate of the travel expenses you will incur; (6) (for citizens or residents of the USA) citizenship or visa status; and (7) (voluntary) indication of your gender and minority status. Women and

members of minority groups are strongly encouraged to apply. In addition to funds provided by the ASL, the program of travel grants to the ASL Annual Meeting and the European Summer Meeting is supported by a grant from the US National Science Foundation; NSF funds may be awarded only to students at US universities and to citizens and permanent residents of the USA. Air travel paid for using NSF funds must be on a US flag carrier. Application by email is encouraged; put "ASL travel application" in the subject line of your message.
